

I anxiously await the snow ending and the April showers. March weather has been unforgiving for outdoor projects, between intermittent snow falls and the cold temperatures it has been hard to find the rare few days of March that were conducive to working outside for public works. They are itching to get out and have their lists together for the many things needed (i.e. potholes, blading streets, cleanup, new hook ups of water and sewer, line maintenance, hydrant flushing, project management, sewer plant upgrades and maintenance, right of way work, and other items as they pop up or are called in).

Bidding on the Ranger Station middle unit ended March 30, 2023, and that city will be looking over the bids for the getting a general contractor on board and getting this project completed this summer.


The new DEQ permit is due at any time for our wastewater treatment plant. The comment periods have ended, and we await the permit to be finalized by DEQ.

The budget meetings are scheduled at the end of this month for April 25-27 at 6pm here at City Hall. If you wish to observe and comment on the FY 2023-2024 budget please come and do so. Public comment on the budget will be had on the 27^{th} of April, but you are free to observe the deliberations on the 25^{th} and 26^{th} .

The City of Union welcomes the newly appointed positions to the Budget and Planning Commission, Brian McDowell to the Budget Committee and Jeff Williams to the Planning Commission. Brian replaces Dick Middleton who was recently elected to the Council and Jeff replaces Dan Davenport who recently stepped down after many years of service. It is always a pleasure to see volunteers step up into these important roles with the City.

Keep a look out, the City of Union will be hiring soon to fill a full-time vacancy in the Public Works Department as a Utility/Water/Maintenance position. I believe we will begin advertising this month for the position with interviews to come near the end of the month. Additionally, we have begun taking applications for a part-time seasonal position as a laborer for the City. Applicants must be age 16 years or older and possess a Driver's License.

Water / Sewer Rates Increase

At the January City Council meeting council approved a 2% rate increase in sewer base rates and a 1% rate increase in water base rates, effective April 1st, 2023. You will see these changes reflect on your May 1st utility billing.

Beginning April 1st water base rate will be \$34.33 for a 3/4" meter. In addition to the base rate each cubic foot used is charged at .005 cents up to 1000 cubic feet, and .0125 per cubic foot thereafter.

Also beginning April 1st sewer base rate will be \$52.53 according to size of meter multiplier. A normal household with a 3/4" meter will be \$52.53.

Therefore a household with a 3/4" meter will have a utility bill base rate, before any water usage, of \$96.86 (includes the EMS fee)

As stated, these new rates will be reflected on the utility bill you receive in May.


Mark the occasion by participating in a local planting event in your area, walking in a local

Avista reminds you safe digging is no accident; call 811 before you dig

Before beginning any outdoor digging project, call 811 at least two business days before you dig. Calling 811 will get a professional locator to your site to mark the approximate location of underground utility lines. There is a two-foot tolerance zone on each side of the line, and it is required to hand dig to determine the precise location of the utility in this tolerance zone. This service is free. Remember, you may have your own utilities that require a Private Locate request at 811.

Knowing where underground utility lines are buried before you dig will help protect you from injury, prevent damages to utilities and service disruptions, and avoid potential fines and repair costs. Underground utility lines can be just about anywhere, so keeping your shovel in the shed or garage and calling 811 first is a smart move (and it's the law).

Every digging job requires a call — even small projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Here are just a few examples of when to call:

- Installing a rural mailbox
- Putting in a fence
- Planting a tree or shrubbery
- Building a patio or deck
- Excavating a new garden area

4 cups snow 1 cup cream 3/4 cup sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

Snippet of Union's History.....

Almost any day an old man, with one leg missing, may be seen hobbling around town encumbered with a bucksaw, seeking for work. When he finds it he goes in with a will and never lets up till his work is accomplished.

He is an inmate of the county poor house and his name is Albert A. McLaughlin. We know not what brought him to this condition, but surely it is through no fault of his. In conversation with him a few days ago he informed us that he was hoarding all his little earnings for the purpose of buying a cork leg which he thought would enable him to work with greater ease, and that he would then be able to support himself.

As the leg will cost nearly a hundred dollars it will be a long time before he gets it, unless he is assisted. Mr. Schoonover, the efficient and kind-hearted supervisor of the poor farm has drawn up subscription papers - subscribing liberally himself - for the purpose of raising money to buy the leg for the old man. One of the papers can be found at this office. If our charitably inclined people will drop in and contribute a very little, each, the old gentleman will have his desires gratified many weary months before he expects it.

Ordinance Education Corner...

As a reminder once again....

Living in a camp trailer is not permitted in the City of Union, even if it is on your property, without going through the planning commission for approval.

There are certain circumstances that the planning commission will consider approval for living in a camp trailer. Such as taking care of elderly family, while building your house, as temporary emergency housing.

The process for going before planning is to bring a drawing of where the trailer will be located, showing that it will meet city regulations for set-backs, a letter of explanation of why you are requesting to live in a camp trailer and to pay the fee of \$350.00 (non-refundable). These items must be into city hall 45 days prior to the next available meeting. The city will send letters to surrounding citizens within 300 feet for any comments, for the approval or against the approval. There will be a staff report prepared and given to the planning commission prior to the planning meeting for them to review and consider. At the planning meeting they will discuss, take any public comments into consideration, and make a decision at that time.

As it appears there is a rising issue of trailers being occupied in city limits, the ordinance officer will be watching for them as she is doing her daily rounds. If needed she will contact the property owner to discuss the matter.
