# Natural Gas Safety Tips.....

We know that natural gas has a rotten egg smell, but do you know what to do or not do if you smell gas?

**DO NOT** remain in the building

**DO NOT** use light switches

**DO NOT** try to find the source of the leak

**DO NOT** smoke or strike matches

**DO NOT** use any electrical equipment that might cause a spark



### SAFETY TIPS

Have at least one working carbon monoxide detector for each level of your home

Never use a gas oven or range top as a space heater

Never cover the temperature controls, air openings, or vents of a gas appliance

Turn off gas fireplaces and space heaters before going to bed, they are not intended to be a main heat source

Check gas appliance connector by a qualified appliance service contractor periodically

Never attach electrical grounding wires to gas piping

Keep the space around furnaces and water heaters clean and clear of build-up, rags, newspapers or other debris

Never store combustibles such as gasoline, aerosol cans, paint, solvents, cleaners etc, near any fuel-burning equipment

Be cautious using products such as paint strippers, glues, varnishes etc as they give off vapors that can be ignited by any flame source, such as a burner pilot light. Vapors can also corrode metal vents and appliance combustion chambers.

Turn off all gas appliances when using these types of products.

Be aware of where gas (and other utility) lines are buried, especially when working outdoors. Always call 811 before you dig!







# What's Happening At The Museum in December:

Winter months mean there is less activity although the Museum's fire truck is scheduled to participate in the holiday parade and of course, maintenance of the buildings is always an ongoing endeavor.

The month of December seems to be noted for early darkness so I was intrigued by the adult craft class November 13 offered by Union Librarian Tiffany. Botanical lanterns certainly focused my thoughts towards historic types of illuminations. I'm so glad I attended this class. Folks who missed out on making botanical lanterns truly missed an evening of fun and camaraderie at the library. These lanterns, each unique to its creator. were charming and reminiscent of paper Chinese lanterns. Fortunately, the use of led lights ensure the lanterns are much safer than the ones in which candles were used.

Kerosene lamps, which were extensively used before electricity, provided lights for dark evenings before the wonderful invention of electric lights. Some of the very early lights prior to kerosene used olive oil, whale oil, tallow, fish oil or bees' wax. I think fish oil or whale oil may have been an interesting source for light that may not have had the same scent factor as a modern scented candle.

Not only did kerosene lamps light up a room but the glass chimney could be used to heat Victorian hair curling irons. These curling irons were placed in the lamp chimney and I haven't found any instructions on how one determined when the iron was ready to use. I suspect singed hair was one of the hazards associated with the use of this hot curling tool.

In addition to the kerosene lamp there were some small lamps called fairy lamps that became quite popular. These little lamps were candle burning night lights that had a base and a shade made of glass. These small lights were usually placed in childrens' rooms and emitted a soft, gentle glow. I read that these fairy lamps were designed to keep children calm and could possibly also be a defense against burglars.

The Fenton Glass Company made many of these lamps in a wide variety of shapes including owls and Santas. Many of the glass shades included hand painted scenes or flowers. I discovered there is a Fairy Lamp Club for collectors. Apparently some of the very old lamps are quite valuable.

Years ago an elderly friend gave me a fairy lamp. I really didn't know what I had. My little lamp is now out of the kitchen cupboard and is warmly glowing in my kitchen window. I'm sure it won't scare any burglars but it is a warm and calming light and is the perfect glow for cold winter nights.

## Snippet of Union's History.....

A fire test of the Union water works which have just been completed was made late Friday and was witnessed by a large number of interested spectators. The test was made under the direction of the contractor and superintendent of the work, Messrs. Keefe and Jones and carried out by the fire department. The tests were satisfactory in every instance. At the intersection of Main and C streets two streams from one hydrant were thrown straight up a distance of seventy-five or eighty feet. Further down on Main street, four streams were thrown at the same time without any apparent diminution in force.

That the tests were satisfactory goes without saying. Union is now well protected against fire and it would be difficult for any conflagration to make much headway before being subdued. A picture was taken of the scene by Jones Bros., the photographers, which is a most excellent piece of work, showing every detail to perfection.

### Ordinance Education Corner...

### Do I Need A Building Permit?

The City of Union requires a 'pre-build' permit on any accessory building, shed, or other structure that is over 120 square feet.

To obtain a pre-build permit bring a sketch of your property with existing buildings are located and where the proposed location of the new building will be, please included measurements to property lines and existing buildings to approve set back requirements.

Set back requirements for accessory buildings is 10ft from rear and side lot lines, except for on a corner lot where the two street sides it is 20ft. Unless attached to an existing building, the new building needs to be 10ft from other buildings for fire code. Homes and garage set backs are 20ft from front lot line, on a corner lot both streets are considered front lot lines. And as with other buildings the set back from rear and side lot lines is 10ft.

A pre-build permit is \$25.00, and we will be able to tell you if you may need to go to the county to inquire about county building permits.
