Snow......We know it's coming sooner or later....

The City of Union has the responsibility for the maintenance function of city streets within its boundaries and should work to control ice, slush and accumulated snow from city streets. In the interest of public health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Union.

The City of Union will work to anticipate dangerous conditions brought on by freezing rain, black ice, or packed and/or freezing snow. Public Works will apply sand to major intersections, steep slopes, and any other area where ice could constitute a significant hazard. The City of Union snow removal policy states that public works may not initiate snow removal operations until four (4) inches of wet heavy snow, four (4) inches of dry blowing snow (20+ mph wind) or six (6) inches of dry powdery snow accumulates on the open ground. Where snow has reached the depths specified above and is not expected to immediately melt, the City may initiate snow removal operations.

Snow removal will be conducted along streets according to their priority in facilitating the movement of emergency vehicles and personnel, school busses, and local traffic.

The City will not be responsible for clearing individual driveways which may become blocked during plowing operations.

Vehicles parked along primary and secondary streets where snow removal occurs may constitute a hazard risk to city equipment and inhibit snow removal operations. It is best to be aware of weather conditions and try to not park on primary street rights-of-way.

MAYBE CONSIDER A HEATED WATER BOWL. IF YOU CAN LET YOUR PET INSIDE, AT LEAST TO A GARAGE OR SHED, WOULD BE IDEAL.

We Can't Encourage This Enough.....

No one wants the expense of the repairs of frozen and/or broken pipes. Take a few simple steps now to prevent this from happening.

And don't forget to let your faucet 'trickle' during those freezing temperatures, this keep water moving through your pipes and the meter, preventing both from freezing up and possibly breaking.

Remember, a 'trickle' is about the size of a pencil lead. That's all it takes to possibly prevent a disaster.



What's Happening At The Museum in January:

There are a few activities going on at the Museum in January 2024. Our curator and three volunteers from Baker City and one from Union will continue accessioning donated items. Maintenance of the buildings is an ongoing task. There are some roof issues which need to be taken care of before the weather gets too bad.

If you haven't visited the Museum before I'd like to introduce you to some of our period rooms. We have a formal parlor, a historic kitchen with a wood cook stove and a pitcher pump, an old -fashioned bathroom with a zinc bathtub and a unique water closet and a lovely bedroom with a stunning hand crocheted bedspread. For me, as a volunteer, one task I have is to help maintain these wonderful displays. In doing so I get to touch, dust, polish and examine the workmanship of past decades.

The formal parlor has a leather horse-hair settee and two large leather rocking chairs. I have come to the conclusion after sitting on all of these antique pieces people probably didn't spend a great deal of time lounging on the furniture. An antique pump organ may have provided some good entertainment, but the seat-ing comfort factor was probably very low.

The old-fashioned kitchen is my favorite. One can imagine the warmth from the wood cook stove and the cozy atmosphere of pots and pans and an ice box with large blocks of ice keeping food cool and a China cabinet with special dishes. There are also old cookbooks, and I discovered a list of "Things worth knowing and remembering" and I'm going to try the recipe for a breakfast table barometer. I hope some of you readers will try it as well. Here is what you do: "A cup of hot coffee is an unfailing barometer if you allow a lump of sugar to drop to the bottom of the cup and watch the air bubbles arise without disturbing the coffee. If the bubbles collect in the middle the weather will be fine; if they adhere to the cup forming a ring it will either rain or snow; and if the bubbles separate without assuming any fixed position changeable weather may be expected." Let's hope this January is one in which all air bubbles from a lump of sugar in your coffee stay in the middle of the cup.

Snippet of Union's History.....

From Mr. Steve Conner, who called on us Wednesday, we learn that Michael Stoker, who lives on Catherine creek above town, while driving in with a sleigh loaded with wood, a few days ago, met with quite a mishap. While coming around the grade a short distance this side of Robins' mill a huge bank of snow was precipitated from above which hurled Mr. Stoker to a considerable distance and completely covered his team. Mr. Connor, who was passing at the time, assisted in hurriedly digging a hole down to the heads of the horses, so they could breathe, when, after about two hours hard work with shovels, they were liberated, having been but very little hurt. The snow was packed around them so hard that an axe had to be used at times to chip it away. It was a narrow escape.
