Spring has begun and as such the weather cannot decide whether it will be 70's and sunny, or 30's and snowing. While we had some record-breaking temperatures in Oregon and many unseasonably warm temperatures here in Union in March, the weather has returned to normal Spring fluctuations while trending upwards.

Work has started on well #2 that will be paid for with the CDBG grant. This well will have improvements completed this summer along with a new building. This project will take approximately 2 ½ to 3 months to complete after which time, well #3 will also be improved to include new controls. The city hopes to have these two projects completed by the end of August.

Public Works is also preparing for several chip seal projects to be completed in mid-July. South 4th will be chip sealed 3 blocks along with portions of E Delta, Bellwood and E Harrison. More to come as the project time approaches.

Public Works will also be completing some scheduled maintenance, repairs, and cleaning at the wastewater treatment plant this summer which will take most of the summer to complete.

The City of Union will be hiring soon to fill a full-time vacancy in the Public Works Department as a Utility/Water/Maintenance position. Advertising will begin this month with interviews towards the end of the month. Applicants must be age 18 years or older and possess a Driver's License.

As a reminder, budget meetings are scheduled for April 23rd-25th at 6pm. We welcome you to come and observe and comment on the FY 2024-2025 budget. Public comment on the budget will be received on April 25th, 2024 at 6:00pm and observation from the public of the budget committees deliberations will be on the 23^{rd} and 24^{th} starting at 6pm.

The Council has formed committees to work on the goals for the 2024-2025 year and encourages citizens to attend and participate. All meetings are here at City Hall. The meeting times are:

Per City of Union Ordinance 508, the city council has reviewed the current water and sewer rates and it has been determined to adjust the water rate at 1% increase, and the sewer rate by 3% increase. For a 3/4 inch meter water service this will raise your base utility bill by \$1.93

AVISTA REMINDS YOU SAFE DIGGING IS NO ACCIDENT; CALL 811 BEFORE YOU DIG

Before beginning any outdoor digging project, call 811 at least two business days before you dig.

Calling 811 will get a professional locator to your site to mark the approximate location of underground utility lines. There is a two-foot tolerance zone on each side of the line, and it is required to hand dig to determine the precise location of the utility in this tolerance zone. This service is free. Remember, you may have your own utilities that require a Private Locate request at 811.

Knowing where underground utility lines are buried before you dig will help protect you from injury, prevent damages to utilities and service disruptions, and avoid potential fines and repair costs. Underground utility lines can be about anywhere, so keeping your shovel in the shed or garage and calling 811 first is a smart move (and It's the law).

Every digging job requires a call ~ even small projects like projects like planting trees and shrubs. The depth of utility lines varies and there may be multiple utility lines in a common area. Here are just a few examples of when to call:

- * Installing a rural mailbox
- * Putting in a fence
- Planting a tree or shrubbery
- * Building a patio or deck
- Excavating a new garden area.

Annual Backflow Preventer Testing ~ Now Is The Time

What is a Backflow preventer:

Backflow preventers keep your drinking water and the city's water safe by keeping potentially contaminated water being drawn back into the public potable water system.

How do I know if I have a backflow preventer:

A **few** examples of who should have a backflow preventer installed and is required to have them tested:

- Irrigation or lawn sprinkler systems
- Swimming pools or spas
- Solar heat systems
- Fire sprinkler systems
- Auxiliary water supplies (wells)
- Laboratory equipment
- Food and beverage processing equipment
- Chemical feed equipment

How often do I have to test my backflow preventer:

Upon initial installation your backflow preventer will be tested. After which it is mandatory that you have your backflow preventer testing annually or after any repairs or cleaning. Since backflow preventers contain parts that can break down and wear out it is important to test at least annually to assure your preventer is functioning properly.

How do I get my backflow preventer tested:

A certified backflow prevention assembly tester must perform tests on your assembly. Although we can't recommend a tester, you can obtain a list of a few certified backflow testers from city hall.

I have had my backflow preventer tested, now what:

You must submit a completed test report to city hall annually.

What happens if I don't have my backflow preventer tested:

City of Union will not be able to allow water service to continue to property with a backflow that has not passed testing and who have not provided a test report to the city.

If you have questions or concerns regarding your backflow or if you are required to have a backflow please contact city hall and we can get public works to speak to you regarding your questions.

Snippet of Union's History.....

Last Tuesday night Mr. Mose Lore, who resides on Catherine Creek a few miles above town, heard a disturbance in his hog pen, situated a short distance from the house, and upon investigation found that a large mountain lion, probably driven from the mountains by hunger, had entered the pen and was presenting his case to the swine.

Mr. Lore and Mr. Anderson, who was present, arming themselves with shot guns proceeded to the pen and firing at the same time killed the lion instantly. It was found that he had dispatched one hog and torn another ones jaw off, besides killing the house cat that by some means had got into his clutches.

WE HAVE HAD MULTIPLE REPORTS OF PEOPLE HAVING LOOSE DOGS AT THE PARK.

Dogs are to be leashed at all times at the park, as it poses a danger to all who use the park. As nice as we all believe our dogs are, they are also unpredictable. There are many people, child or adult, that are fearful of dogs and yet all deserve to enjoy the city park as everyone else. Also, there are doggy poo bags available at two locations in the park.....use them, nothing can ruin any day by stepping in poo that has not been picked up!

NOTE: It is a city ordinance that all dogs are not allowed to run at large anywhere in city limits, and if observed the owner or person in charge of the dog-can and will be cited.



Always Assume a Downed Power Line Is Deadly

Overhead power lines carry thousands of volts of electricity. If a line is down, always assume it is energized and dangerous, even if the power is out in your area. Touching or getting near a live power line can injure or kill.

Never approach an accident scene where a line is down or damaged. You could become a victim if you enter an energized area.

Power lines can fall or sag close to the ground for a few reasons, including severe weather or damage from a truck or car accident. Remember, a downed power line isn't always visible. After severe weather, lines can lurk underneath water or debris or could be tangled in fallen trees.

Stay clear ~ at least 50 feet ~ of all types of utility lines. Even if you think the lines might be telephone or cable service lines.

Power lines do not have to be arcing, sparking or making a humming noise to be live.

If a power line falls on your vehicle, do not attempt to drive away or get out of the vehicle. Call 911 for help and stay inside until crews say it is safe.
