

As the saying goes April showers bring May flowers. I am enjoying all the color that is popping up around town. A part of springtime events is the annual community Clean-Up Day that is happening on May 11th from 9am-1pm. Please take advantage of this opportunity to bring in your yard debris and other items that have accumulated over the winter (please refer to section on clean-up day for specifics on accepted items).

Public Works has several projects that are happening now and others that are coming up soon. These include work on well #2, paid for with grant dollars and will also take public works time to complete. The hope is to have the well project complete on both wells by the end of August. Public Works is also preparing for several chip sealing projects that will be happening in mid-July. More information is to come in the June newsletter on areas that will see work completed.

Public Works is required to inventory all water lines for lead piping. I have contributed \$100 personally to a drawing on June 5th for a gift card. Please return your surveys by June 3rd to be entered into this drawing. Survey is included with this newsletter.

The City of Union will be hiring soon to fill a full-time vacancy in the Public Works Department as a Utility/Water/Maintenance position. The hope is to have that position filled by late May, early June.

Budget meetings wrapped up last week with the budget committee voting to approve the budget to go forward to council for deliberations in June. The budget hearing for the 2024-2025 budget will be held on June 10th at 7:15pm at city hall. I want to thank all of the budget committee members for giving of their time last week and providing their input on the proposed budget. Thank You!

Coming up on June 24th at 6pm, there will be a work session held on the proposed Parks Master Plan with the architect in attendance. Please attend to give your input on what you would like to see in your town.

As a reminder, don't forget to vote come May 21st. There are county positions as well as measures that will be on the ballot including the annexation of city fire and EMS services into the Union Rural Fire Protection District. Please make sure to fill out your ballots and let your voice be heard!



Union Residents,


Recently the city installed a new influent screen at the treatment facility, and to keep it and the rest of the treatment facility working for many years to come, we want to educate our residents/business owners what should not go down your drain or toilet.

The city's treatment facility is designed to handle only water, human waste and toilet tissue. And that is all.

Any other items lead to blockages, equipment damage, equipment failure and costly repair or replacement costs. These costs are paid for by you - the customer in sewer rates.

Examples of a few items that should NOT go down the drain or toilet to the city sewer system:

- * Cloth rags or towels
- * Baby wipes, toilet wipes, hygiene towelettes, disinfecting wipes, or cloth wipes of any kind. Even if they indicate they are 'flushable' or 'biodegradable' they truly are not and the city's treatment facility will not operate properly when these are in the sewer system.
- * Paper no Kleenex, no paper towels. Only toilet tissue!
- * Medications or medical items, such as syringes
- * Feminine hygiene products or prophylactics
- * Beauty products, dental floss, q-tips, or makeup
- * Plastics of any kind
- * Grease of any kind especially cooking grease
- * Garden supplies, pesticides or fertilizers
- * Paint, varnishes or paint remover



ONLY WATER, HUMAN WASTE AND TOILET TISSUE SHOULD BE FLUSHED INTO THE CITY SEWER SYSTEM! PREVENT SEWER BACKUPS, EQUIPMENT REPAIRS OR EQUIPMENT FAILURES, NOT JUST TO THE CITY SEWER, BUT ALSO YOUR PRIVATE SEWER SYSTEM, LEADING TO COSTLY REPAIRS.

Puncture Vine, Knapweed, Whitetop and Thistle.
