From The Desk Of.....

June is here with warmer weather and lots of sunshine! Thank you to the council members and staff who participated in the annual community Clean-Up Day last month and contributed towards making the community a cleaner place! Also thank you to the Union/Cove softball team for their help as well!

Many events coming up within the city including the annual 4th of July Celebration will again be held at the Buffalo Peak Golf Course. Come celebrate our freedom. It's going to be a great time!

The City Council will hold its budget hearing for the 2025-2026 budget on June 9th at 7:15PM and will consider adopting the budget that was forwarded to them from the Budget Committee. Come listen, learn and/or comment. As always you may come down to city hall and I will be glad to go over it with you or answer any questions you may have.

Also Coming up on June 9th, there will also be a work session at 6pm to discuss deer in city limits. Please come to voice your thoughts on this topic and let the city council know how you feel.

As part of the charter review, there are some suggested changes that I have been sharing with you each month and may be discussed at a future council meeting. If council would agree with the suggested changes, it would be referred to voters in a future election for consideration. I started sharing some of the suggested changes in last month's newsletter. This next section to share comes from the Charter Chapter IV. It has been suggested to re-number each section to correspond with the Chapter that it is located. For example, Sections 13-19 could be re-numbered 4.1-4.8 that would correspond to Chapter 4 where they are located. The wording changes suggested are as follows with the strikethroughs, the suggested deletions, and the words in parenthesis the suggested additions.

Section ~~13-4.1~~ Council Meetings. The council shall provide a time and place for its regular meetings and adopt rules and regulations ~~for the~~ (that) ~~government~~ (govern) of its members and proceedings. It shall meet regularly at least once each month. The mayor, either upon his own motions or upon the request of three or more members of the council, may call a special meeting of the council for any time by giving notice of the meeting to all members of the council then in the city. Special meetings of the council may also be held by common consent of all the members of the council.

(Section 4.2 Work Sessions The council may have work sessions where the governing body can receive information and have preliminary discussions, but members cannot make decisions or take action. Public comment is not required by Oregon law, but at the discretion of the Mayor, public comment can be taken.)

Section ~~14.~~ (4.3) Quorum. A majority of the members of the council shall constitute a quorum to do business, but a ~~less~~ (lesser) number may meet and compel attendance of the absent members in a manner provided by ordinance. The mayor shall be deemed a ~~councilman~~ (councilor) for the purpose of constituting a quorum.

Section ~~15.~~(4.4) Journal (Record) ~~The council shall keep a journal of its proceedings; and, upon the request of the mayor or two of its members, the ayes and nays upon a question before it shall be taken and a record of the vote entered in the journal.~~ (A record of the council meeting, including the ayes and nays of a vote, must be kept in a manner prescribed by the council rules and Oregon revised statutes.)

Section 16. (4.5) Meetings to Be Public. The deliberations and proceedings of the council shall be public, (except those designated by Oregon Revised Statutes which may be exempt from the public.)

Section 17. (4.6) Mayor's Duties at Council Meetings. The mayor shall be the presiding officer of the council. ~~He~~ (The mayor) shall not vote except in case of a tie vote of the members of the council present at a meeting (or to provide quorum) ~~He~~ (The mayor) shall have authority to preserve order, enforce the rules of the council and determine the order of business under the rules of the council.

Section 18. (4.7) President of the Council. ~~At its first meeting after the adoption of this charter, and thereafter at its first meeting of each succeeding year~~ (At the first meeting of each year), the council by ballot shall elect a president from its membership. In the mayor's absence from a council meeting, the president shall preside. Whenever the mayor is unable, on account of absence, illness or other cause to perform the functions of ~~his~~ (their) office, the president of the council shall act as mayor.

Section 19. (4.8) Vote Required. The concurrence of a majority of the members of the council present at any meeting shall be necessary to determine any question before the council, except in case of a tie vote, and in the event of a tie vote the mayor shall cast the deciding vote.

Main Street Musings for June 2025

Music in our park again this summer. Main Street Union's Family Roots Blues & Brews will be happening again on the 3rd Friday evening of each month this summer; June 20, July 18, August 15. Vendors will begin setting up around 4pm with warm-up musicians performing from 5 to 6pm with main bands starting a 6pm. June 20th will have Bag of Hammers performing, July 18th you can come and enjoy Columbia Jones, and for August 15th Fading Sage Band closes out Main Street Union's summer music events. Come enjoy the music, stroll through the park, view local artisans and crafter wares, grab a bite to eat from several food vendors, and enjoy a cold beverage in Brewski's Beer Garden. Sponsors for the events and donations are always welcome to help defray the cost of these community building events.

Main Street Union volunteers, along with help from Union's FFA Chapter, have placed summer planters along Main Street again this year. Businesses support this project by covering the cost of the flowers, volunteers ensure they stay watered. If you would like a planter at your business or want to help keep the flowers watered stop by Catherine Creek Gardens and Gifts and talk to Meriah Williams project coordinator.

Park update- MSU received an architectural design for replacing/repairing the turn-around memorial on 1st Street from Ralph Edwards. MSU will discuss this design at their June 11th meeting. Park Project volunteers and City Administrator Celeste Tate met with Ben Stanford of Ross Recreation Equipment to begin narrowing play equipment options that MSU will take to the classrooms early next school year to have the children assist in selecting equipment for their new playgrounds.

There are two openings on the City of Union Historic Commission, anyone interested should fill out a volunteer application and turn in to City Hall. This Commission only has five(5) members so being short two(2) may greatly affect the commission's ability to do important work towards our community's historic preservation. The Historic Commission meets on the 4th Wednesday of the month generally in the evening.

Main Street Union meets on the 2nd Wednesday of each month in the old Knitkabob building at 6pm, anyone interested in helping Union Build on Community Assets and make Union the Quality Community we all wish to live, work, and invest in, will be welcomed. You DO NOT have to own property on Main Street, or own a Historic home, or even be a resident of Union, you only have to want to help make positive changes.




Baker City Cycling Classic 2025

What's Happening at the Museum....

Summer is here and the Museum is open.

There are new displays just waiting to be shared with our visitors. One of our new items is a vacuum tube radio and its accompanying cathedral shaped speaker. This radio (larger than a bread box) has made a journey from belonging to Reverend Floyd White who was the minister at the Methodist Church in Union in the late 1930's and early 1940's. The White family, which consisted of 6 boys, enjoyed listening to this radio. Some of the popular programs of that time were The Shadow, The Lone Ranger, Will Rogers, Jack Benny, Fred and Gracie Allen and Eddie Cantor. After leaving Union the White's moved to La Grande where Floyd was the pastor at the Hendrix Methodist Church. From La Grande this radio moved around with family members until it finally ended up in Anchorage, Alaska. It was then returned to Union and was donated to the museum. Phil Yost, radio repair man and radio aficionado completely refurbished the radio so that it now looks like new. It's interesting to open the top lid and see all of the tubes that made it function.

Apparently radio broadcasting had to overcome a great deal of skepticism in its early days. One unnamed comedian stated "I just don't hold with furniture that talks." Public acceptance was hampered in early days because of the primitive receiving equipment. To listen to early broadcasts people had to use headphones and constantly move what was known as the cat's whisker. The whisker was a movable wire made of silver, brass or copper wire that the listener poked at a piece of lead sulfide to tune in a signal picked up by a long antenna stuck somewhere on top of the house.

Many Union County residents probably remember how popular the 1450 KLBM radio station in La Grande was. Local news, weather, national events, music and the very popular Christmas program with Squeegie, who assisted with the reading of local children's letters to Santa kept the county entertained. Aren't the technological advances today amazing!

It's nice to be able to see how commonplace items like a radio have evolved. You are invited to come to the museum and take a peek inside the previously mentioned tube radio. Unfortunately it no longer is capable of receiving radio waves to its glass tubes due to the threat of fire.

The Third Tuesday programs for the summer months will start with the first event at 7 p.m. on June 17th. The program will feature a traveling trunk containing many unique, useful and mysterious items from the past. You will have an opportunity to touch, twist knobs and see many items that definitely make one appreciate our modern day conveniences. Put June 17 at 7 p.m. at the Little White Church on your calendar. It will be a fun evening.



Snippet of Union's History.....

There arrived in this city last Wednesday seven new bicycles, made by the Nicholson Manufacturing Company of Chicago, which were ordered by different boys around town. Bicycles may now be seen upon our streets at any time and many amusing sight are the direct result of the beginners trying to make "flowery plays" before spectators who congregate on corners, anxious to see the fun. We predicted that our streets, in a few days after the arrival of the machines, would resemble the exercise corridor of a railroad hospital. But our prediction has not as yet been fulfilled as no serious casualties have occurred so far.

Don't Forget....it's time to test your backflow prevention device!

The Oregon Health Authority requires that all back flow assemblies be tested once each year by a certified tester. The City of Union's public works department works hard to provide safe clean water to our citizens, testing your backflow prevention device is vital as the city's water system can become unsafe whenever backflow occurs.

You may have a backflow prevention device (cross connection) that needs tested if you have any of the following:

- ◆ Irrigation or lawn sprinkler system
- ◆ Swimming pool or spa
- ◆ Fire suppression sprinkler system
- ◆ Food and beverage processing equipment
- ◆ A well that is connected to the city water system

If you have a cross connection please send your test results to the City of Union Public Works Department at PO Box 529 Union, OR 97883 or drop it off at City Hall.

Historic Commission...

Noxious Weeds.....it is of most importance to remove them from your property!

We all know how fast weeds can grow and spread! Noxious weeds are the most extreme concern, for both our local community and the county. Union County is part of the Tri-County Region weed control, they are dedicated to the cause of diminishing noxious weeds on private and public lands. While there are 28 weeds on the Tri County Cooperative Weed Management Area, these are a few noxious weeds that are persistent within city limits. Watch for these and remove them as soon as found!



Whitetop is a perennial and grows up to 2 feet tall. It has blue green leaves that are up to 4 inches long. Flowers are small white 4 petaled flowers that give the plant a white flat topped appearance. Blooms by May into mid-summer. Roots can go do a depth of 6 feet.

Puncturevine grows in dense mats lying close to the ground with trailing stems. This weed gets a five petal yellow flower between July-October. Also called Goat Heads due to the 'horns' on the dried seeds. Seeds viable 4-5 years!



There are several varieties of thistle, some grow up to 12 feet tall. Roots are deep and dense, sending out roots and shoots. Thistle seeds are viable up to 8 years. Flowers are purple with ovoid heads. Flowers bloom July-August.



Knapweed has either purple, pinkish, or white shaggy flower numerous in clusters. Blooms from June to September. Once gone to seed, seeds are viable for up to nine years. Has an extensive root system and can go to 3 feet in depth. Spreads by both seeds and root fragments.
